Keynote Sessions: The Science of Recovery

Two Integrated Trainings are Offered Consecutively as This Year's Keynote Sessions (These sessions offer a total of 10.0 hours over two days)

The Science Of Recovery:

Applying Neuropsychology And Neuroscience To Your Practice

Session Description and Objectives: This skills training event will give the participant an understanding of the neuroscience and neuropsychology of recovery from addictive disorders. From this profound understanding, psychotherapeutic and pharmacological techniques will be described that can assist the participant while working with clients in early recovery. This assistance is in the areas of cognitive enhancement, increased motivation and management of craving. Emphasis will be placed on the cognitive-behavioral treatment of craving.

The Science Of Recovery: An Advanced Clinical Seminar On Addiction And Recovery

Session Description and Objectives: Neurobiology and neuropsychology are teaching us more and more about addiction. This understanding is revealing new aids for recovery, as well as, confirming traditional approaches.

This skills building seminar will give participants a “state of the art” understanding of addiction and how this understanding shapes an evidence-based approach to clinical care. This is an advanced skill training presentation integrating psychotherapy, pharmacotherapy, wellness and spiritual approaches to recovery. The goal is to give patients the best possible tools for successful personal recovery. Emphasis is placed on a neurobiological understanding of addiction and how this affects clinical approach.

Presenter: Cardwell C. Nuckols, MA, PhD

Dr. Cardwell C. Nuckols is described as “one of the most influential clinical and spiritual trainers in North America.” His passion and mission is to assist in the integration of emerging scientific research with traditional spiritual and self-help knowledge. From this integration comes knowledge, inspiration and technique helpful to those whose practice assists alcoholics, addicts and other mental health patients find healing and their personal road to recovery.

Dr. Nuckols is widely published, having authored more than 60 journal articles, 30 books and workbooks, 50 DVDs, CDs and videos, and 25 audiotape series. His formal educational background includes advanced work in such areas as medical research, pharmacology, neurobiology, education and psychology. Tuesday, November 15

The Changing Landscape of Addiction Treatment and Recovery, From a Medical Perspective

This session offers a total of 4.0 hours

Session Description:



“Affordable Care Act,” “ROSC,” “SBIRT,” “Electronic Health Records,” “Medication Assisted Treatment,” “Primary Care –Behavioral Health Integration.” These are all terms that have begun to permeate the substance use disorder treatment lexicon. They are causing the treatment community to examine some long-held constructs and to redefine terms like “recovery” and “successful outcome.”

The presentations and panel discussion are designed to provide attendees the opportunity to hear different perspectives on topics related to this new order from a broad range of healthcare providers in the substance use disorder treatment field. Attendees will have the opportunity to ask members of the Panel questions. Some of the topics that panel members will address are:

- How do you see the move toward more integration of Primary Care, Mental Health and Addiction Services affecting the current Addiction Treatment paradigm in South Carolina? Additionally, how will the move to electronic health records impact substance use disorder treatment, from a positive or negative perspective?
- Addiction is referred to as a “chronic disease.” Does addiction treatment reflect standard medical practice for chronic disease management and if not how might addiction treatment change to reflect current medical standards of care for “chronic” diseases?
- An increasing number of pharmacological therapies are demonstrating efficacy in reducing the use of alcohol and illegal/non-prescribed drugs in individuals with Substance Use Disorders. What is your opinion of these medication-assisted treatments, and in the broader concept of “medication assisted recovery?”
- From a medical standpoint, is it unethical not to use these medications in an addiction treatment setting?
- Several medications are used to treat psychiatric disorders that in the traditional field of addiction treatment are viewed as problematic for individuals with Substance Use Disorders (i.e. benzodiazepines). Is there a place for these medications in addiction treatment?
- More states are approving the use of marijuana for medical purposes. Is this merely a “back door” way of legalizing marijuana or are there legitimate medical uses for it?
- South Carolina has a “prescription monitoring program” for pharmacies and physicians. Would it be beneficial for addiction treatment programs to participate in this system?
- A major United Nations Panel stated that the “war on drugs” has failed and recommended legalization. From a medical and addiction treatment/prevention perspective would such a move be positive or negative?
